Behind the house you can visit the St Nicholas Garden, with its intriguing sculptures known as the Tontine Heads.







Wheelchair access to the ground floor of Provand's Lordship, reached via a gradual ramp around the St Nicholas Garden and through a historic door. For the door to be opened, please phone 0141 276 1625 (the line will be answered by staff at St Mungo Museum of Religious Life and Art, the Glasgow Life Museums venue opposite Provand's Lordship, who will assist). Due to the age and nature of the building, there is no lift to the first and second floors, but two audio-visual displays on the ground floor show some of the upper rooms.
